

DABBI'S MESSAGE



Happy Birthday Israel Rabbi Jeffrey Lipschultz

This April 19th is Yom Haatzmut or Israel Independence Day, a special day to commemorate the miracle of the modern state of Israel. This year Israel turns 70. It's a big birthday because if you think about the need to have a Jewish country after over two thousand years it's something of a modern day miracle. The fact that Israel is seventy and seen as just another normal country is truly amazing when one looks at the history of modern day Zionism and its struggle for completion. The many wars Israel experienced in its seventy years reminds us how truly astonishing the modern day state of Israel is.

What does it mean to be normal? It means to have an element of self-determination as a nation; it means having the ability to defend oneself, and to fulfill all the roles necessary in building a complete society. For almost two thousand years the Jewish people had lived as outsiders, a smaller group in a larger nation. For much of that time Jews were not considered citizens of the lands in which they lived. Even after their emancipation, Jews were socially and politically marginalized by European society. They could not participate fully in the life of the nation, they had limited economic or social options and they had little control over their own destiny.

The early Zionists argued that only by creating a Jewish state could we participate in every aspect of society like all other people. If we wanted to be a "normal people" we had to learn to work the land, create our own government, build cities and even collect our own garbage. Zionists suggested that as long as we lived among other people we would never truly discover what it meant to be a proud nation.

So here we are, over a hundred years after the founding of the Zionist movement and Israel's seventy years of sovereignty and we've succeeded. We're a normal people, living in our own land. We're soldiers, diplomats, entrepreneurs and factory workers. We collect our own garbage. But we are also criminals, drug addicts and prostitutes. Maybe we've become too normal. Like all other nations we have our share of prejudice, brutality, and corruption. Recently Tel Aviv did not look so different from Baltimore only warmer in the winter with better beaches.

"This must not happen in Israel." Those are the words of Prime Minister Netanyahu addressing the crisis taking place in Israel as she tries to balance between normal and exceptional. Israel ideally is supposed to be a light unto the nations and thus as hard as it seems to understand we are not to be a normal nation. Israel is facing challenges that most other nations cannot even imagine. A normal nation must defend itself at all costs and maintain a semblance of order. A holy nation must strive to live up to higher ideals and it must strive to maintain a moral vision of the world. It may not always succeed in attaining this aspiration but it cannot stop trying. Prejudice and racism are not just bad for Israel; they are an anathema for who we are as Jews, whether dati or hiloni, religious or secular.

Like America, Israel was founded on a moral vision. When Israel fails to live up to that vision, it fails to be the nation it was meant to be. Preservation is only half the equation for a Jewish homeland. The other half is to become "a nation of priests and a holy people." That, it seems to me, is what makes Israel different, and what makes America different as well. Neither America nor Israel are normal nations. Both nations were founded not just on political expediency but also on faith, vision and a moral aspiration.

Please come to the Lunch and Learns we have scheduled for April as we discuss the role of Israel in our world and our responsibility to her. Come share lunch and discuss how Israel can be a better country, a true light unto the nations.

About Marguerite Mishkin

Marguerite Mishkin is a hidden child of the Holocaust. She was born to Jewish parents in Belgium in 1941. Her father was taken to Auschwitz concentration camp the next year where he was murdered. Knowing that Marguerite and her older sister Annette were in great danger, their mother approached the Belgian Resistance movement for help. Through the Resistance, she was able to send her children into hiding with a rural Belgian Catholic family in 1943. They remained with that family until 1946. Meanwhile, in 1944, Marguerite's mother was captured and sent to Auschwitz, where she also was murdered. After the war, Marguerite and her sister were removed from the Belgian family's care and sent to a Jewish orphanage in Brussels. From there, they were both adopted by a Chicago rabbi and his wife in 1950. Marguerite grew up in Chicago, graduated from Roosevelt University, and became a teacher. Now retired, she often speaks on the Holocaust to school, college, and community groups.

Memorial Plaques—In Jewish tradition there are stages of mourning, which help a person through the process of grieving. Many synagogues, including ours, also have customs that help facilitate remembering your loved one.

Yahrzeit plaques serve to honor the memory of a loved one and ensure their name will be read before mourner's kaddish, even after relatives move or pass away. The plaque made of bronze will hang in a place of honor upon the dedicated Memorial Wall located inside the Tri-City Jewish Center.
